



New York Greek Film Expo moves to New Jersey October 7-8

Go Greek at the Barrymore Film Center in Fort Lee, NJ

ASTORIA, NY – September 16, 2025 – The **New York Greek Film Expo**, moves to the **Barrymore Film Center in Fort Lee, New Jersey on October 7-8**. Tickets are now available [here](#).

On **Tuesday, October 7**, see the **New Jersey premiere** of ***Meat***, directed and written by Dimitris Nakos. The film stars Akilas Karazisis, Kostas Nikouli, and Pavlos Iordanopoulos. The film, called “a slow burn thriller”, won Best Greek Film at the Thessaloniki Greek Film Festival. Nikouli took home the 2025 Best Actor award from the Hellenic Film Academy.

The story follows a father who goes to extremes when his indolent son commits murder. He tries to protect his son from prosecution and conviction—and himself from social shame. His actions reek of ingrained prejudice and moral decay and ultimately lead to familial breakdown.

On **Wednesday, October 8**, see ***Little England***. The film, directed by Pantelis Voulgaris, was adapted from the acclaimed novel, *The Jasmine Isle*, by Ioanna Karystiani, who also wrote the screenplay. The 2013 film garnered the Hellenic Film Academy Award for Best Picture. Following the film, stay for an audience Q&A with acclaimed lead actor Andreas Konstantinou, visiting from Greece.

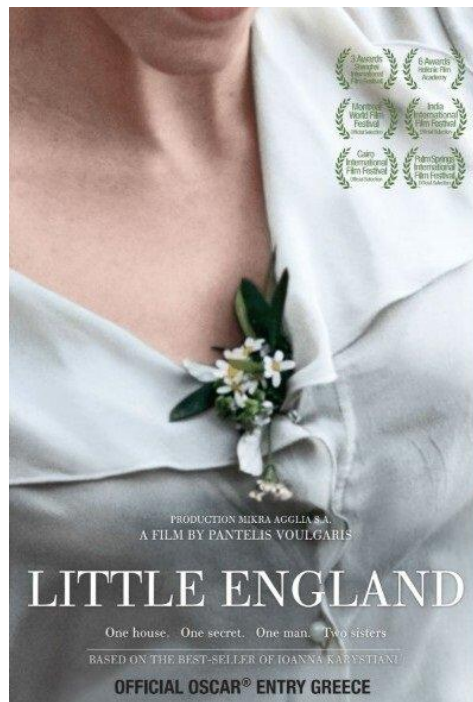
The film, starring Penelope Tsilika, Sofia Kokkali, Aneza Papadopoulou, Konstantinou, and Vangelio Andreadaki is a story of passion, family and loss, as two sisters are divided due to their love for the same man. The title “Little England” refers to the island of Andros, where the film takes place, and its success in its rivalry with the mighty shipping industry of England before WWII.

The Hollywood Reporter called *Little England*, “...a woman’s picture in the most positive sense of the word...impeccably acted...the trio of female protagonists is never less than mesmerizing....”

The annual festival, presented by Hellenic Film Society (HFS), opens on October 2 at the Directors Guild Theater in Manhattan. On October 3-5, films will be screened at Village East Theater, also in Manhattan. Finally, the festival moves to Museum of the Moving Image in Astoria on October 10-12 for a special

retrospective of the films of Pantelis Voulgaris, one of Greece's most prominent filmmakers. Tickets are available now on HFS' [website](http://www.hellenicfilmsociety.org).

Both screenings at the Barrymore begin at 7:30 pm on both nights. And you don't have to be Greek! All films have English subtitles. The Barrymore Film Center is located at 153 Main Street in Fort Lee, New Jersey.
